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

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

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Gaelic League Irish American Club of Detroit kicks off Emerald Campaign

fter postponing 100th anniversary celebrations due to the pandemic, members of the Gaelic League Irish American Club of Detroit are rejoicing in a semblance of normalcy. An exhibit "The Gaelic League of Detroit: Proud Past, Promising

Future" is on now through March 27 at the Detroit Historical Museum. Preparations are underway for the Sunday, March 13 St. Patrick's Parade that marches past the Gaelic League's home on Michigan Ave. in Corktown. And, perhaps most importantly, the League has kicked off its Emerald Campaign to ensure that the Gaelic League can remain where it has been for the last 70 years.

"We have been in this building since the early 1950s and we want to stay here, but there is a lot of work to be done," says president Kathleen Finley.

"We need vital repairs to keep going.

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The building is over 100 years old. The flood last summer caused serious damage," says Finley. "We have wonderful volunteers who donate their time and resources to the building, but we now need a new HVAC system, roof, something from top to bottom."

For \$250, donors can have their name added to a permanent Campaign display at the Gaelic League. The goal of the Emerald Campaign, which will cover only vital renovations, is \$75,000. It has so far raised just over \$40,000.

"We are known for our bar, but we are first an organization to promote Irish culture," says Finley. To that end, the League offers countless classes, from Irish dance to Irish language to Irish music and beyond. Social events, live music sessions and more pack the calendar and the club has become a home-away-from-home for countless members.

"It's a welcoming, loving community," says Finley. And you need not be Irish to join.

Membership to the Irish American Club is \$20 per year and required for drinks at the bar. Membership to the Gaelic League requires a minimum two years of active membership in the Irish American Club and Irish ancestry.

Life at the Gaelic League is deeply entwined with Ireland. "People call in from Ireland with the local sports scores. We have a radio station that reports all of this," says Finley. "We record currently at a radio station proper, but would like to create a radio station in-house."

For now, that's a long term goal. Throughout the pandemic, revenue slowed. "The last president, Theresa Anaya, really kept us going," says Finley. The Emerald Campaign is vital "if we not only want to survive here, but want to thrive here."

To donate to the Emerald Campaign or join the Irish American Club, visit gaelicleagueofdetroit.org or stop in during business hours — Fridays, 5 p.m. to midnight; Saturdays, 5 p.m. to midnight and Sundays, noon to 6 p.m.

Finley is looking forward to the annual St. Patrick's Parade on Sunday, March 13 and then, of course, St. Patrick's Day on March 17. "Those are our two biggest days of the year," says Finley. "We are getting back to normalcy. Classes are coming back. Soon, we hope, there will be something every day."

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t just wouldn't be St. Patrick's Day without corned beef and green beer, and Mack Avenue's two Irish-themed bars are happy to oblige - just as they have for years.

In fact, this will be the 42nd year for Irish Coffee Bar & Grill in Grosse Pointe Farms, which opens that day at 11 a.m. for those eager to start celebrating. Mike Kennedy runs the popular local hangout that was established in 1980 by his father. John, who still drops by on occasion, and his mother, Kathy, who will once again make her traditional Irish **By Joyce Wiswell**

stew. The establishment will also offer corned beef sandwiches along with the rest of the menu, and they're hoping to add live bagpipes to the mix.

The COVID-19 shutdowns were an enormous challenge for many businesses in the area, and Irish Coffee Bar & Grill was no exception. But Mike Kennedy says he got a good feeling about weathering the storm right from the start.

"The first St. Patrick's Day we had during COVID (in 2020) was the first day we had to shut down. We only found



out the night before that we would be closed, and everything was already prepped and ready to go," he says. "We had a lot of support from the community and did 100 carry-outs that day. We really had no idea what to expect and it blew up!"

That encouragement meant the world to the Kennedys, who take their responsibility to their regular patrons seriously. "People have been coming here since their parents brought them in,

> and now they are bringing in their own kids," says Mike, who has operated the establishment for the past decade. "We are a perfect recipe between my dad and his old-school style and me bringing in a newer style gradually over the years, like adding

craft beers, TVs and an internet jukebox. We got the booths reupholstered but didn't change the color or style, and all the chairs are new but if you didn't know

better they are from 1980. It hasn't broke yet so we aren't fixing it."

Over at the Cabbage Patch Saloon in Grosse Pointe Park, a large statue of St. Patrick will oversee March 17's festivities, which begin at 9 a.m. "for the diehards," says owner Alicia Carlisle. Her late husband, John, is well remembered as the proprietor of Jimmy Mack's, a popular sports bar that offered 50-cent Molson's whenever the Detroit Red Wings scored a goal. "The Wings were doing really well then and we'd go through 100 cases a night," Carlisle laughs.

The Cabbage Patch, which Alicia opened in 2014 after John's death. specializes in craft cocktails, whiskeys from around the world, and craft beers and spirits from Michigan. Customers especially love it when someone orders

the vintage Jameson Irish Whiskey that is enshrined behind lock and key in a special velvet-lined tabernacle, which lights up and plays bagpipe music when opened.

"St. Patrick's is one of our busiest days for sure," says Carlisle. "We'll have live music all day and night, bagpipers will come through every hour, and our four bartenders will all wear kilts."

The bar endured its pandemic-ordered closings and unfortunately "some people are still reluctant to come out," Carlisle says, adding that they engage in regular deep cleaning and keep a supply of hand sanitizers available every three feet.

Though the Cabbage Patch doesn't usually offer food besides popcorn, corned beef sandwiches – or, as Carlisle says, "THE best corned beef sandwiches" - are a notable exception for St. Patrick's Day.

"Everyone comes through that day," she says. "The Guinness and Jameson will be flowing." 🦻

amily plays a big part in the classic cars Wayne Wegner has. His 1957 Thunderbird was inspired by his daughter and his 1930 Model A Ford belonged to his late father.

And as for his pretty blue 1967 Chevrolet Camaro?

"That was my mother-in-law's first new car," says Wegner, of Grosse Pointe Woods, who has his law office in St. Clair Shores.

Tell me about the Camaro.

It was brand new in 1967 when she got it. When I was in law school, I bought it and drove it. Then I stored it and eventually restored it. When I got it, I think it had 25,000 miles on it and now **By Robert Musial**

it has about 90,000 miles.

Did it always have that classic Camaro racing stripe around the grille?

Yes. I've got the original bill-of-sale from Tennyson Chevrolet — and that's the way it came.

What work have you done on it?

I got new front fenders for it from Kip Tennyson back in the mid-1970s and replaced the rear quarter-panel. Actual stock parts, not reproductions. We also had it blasted and repainted in the original color. The interior is all original; I just had to replace the carpeting.

How was the engine? Originally, it had a six-cylinder engine with a Powerglide transmission. But we pulled the drivetrain out and put in a 396 (cubic inch) V8 with a nice cam. Now, it has a better sound and it's a little faster than the six-cylinder. And my mother-in-law is happy with it.

Where have you gone in it?

Oh, locally, and out on Woodward. We like to go out there before the actual cruise day. It seemed like (August 2021), everyone was anxious to get out there with their cars because they couldn't in 2020, though people still came out unofficially then.

What's the appeal of a car like a 1960s Camaro?

Nostalgia plays a big part of it. We like to relive those memories.

Is your living trust a doorstop?

or years, individuals have used revocable living trusts as a means to avoid probate and keep their financial affairs private. However, the mere fact that one has a living trust does NOT necessarily mean probate will be avoided upon death.

Probate is avoided only if the trust

maker has transferred his or her assets into the trust or otherwise ensured that the assets are not subject to probate. The process of transferring



assets to a living trust is called "funding" or "asset allocation."

If you have a living trust, but have not transferred your assets into the trust, you have what I refer to as a "doorstop" and likely an expensive one at that! An unfunded living trust may be used for a doorstop or a paperweight, but it will not avoid probate.

The act of creating a living trust does not automatically transfer assets into the trust. Even if the trust states that you transfer all of your assets into the trust, or have a schedule attached to the trust listing the assets that are in the trust, does not transfer them to the trust. Each asset, whether real estate, bank and brokerage accounts, boats, etc., must be individually transferred to the trust.

It is wise to periodically check whether all of your assets are properly titled to your trust. If you do not have a trust, it would be smart to speak with an estate planning attorney about establishing one for your peace of mind as well as for your loved ones.

eth Romine and Laura Hernandez-Romine were living in New York City when the time came to think about schools for their son, Fernando.

"I told Laura, if you want a charming life by the water, for far cheaper, we should move to Grosse Pointe," says Romine,

Global Director of Commercials at Google. Romine grew up just down the street from their current home.

The couple found the 1930s beauty in 2012. "It was abandoned, vacant for months. The windows were cracked, there was a lot of lead, the roof was a mess, there were holes in the floor." But, Romine laughs, "we fell in love with the house." Their neighbors have been perhaps the best part about buying the house. A street laden with a sense of community, plenty of children and regular block

parties offered son Fernando, 12, the kind of childhood Romine enjoyed.

And so the couple set out to restore the house to the family home it once was — not only in maintaining the original footprint, but also with respect to a time before televisions dominated fireplace mantels.

"We entertain a lot, play games, eat dinner in the dining room at least two or three times a week," says Romine. While they do have a television, it is relegated to the basement.

To achieve a circular flow for

entertaining. the Romines connected the four seasons room (their "dining porch") and the kitchen. Now, they can carry meals directly from the kitchen onto the dining porch for spring and summertime dinners.

The kitchen underwent two renovations, the most recent with the help of The Blake Company/ Mutschler Kitchens.

"The atmosphere is greenhouse meets butler's pantry," says Romine. The room features glass upper cabinets and hidden refrigeration and freezer.

"There are zones to the kitchen, which I think is important," with space for every type of endeavor, from prepping to cooking to socializing.

"I wanted an airy, elegant way of entertaining. I didn't want to see appliances or a refrigerator, no disruption in the plane of vision."

The overall goal was to create a sense

of peace and space. This included brightening each room by painting the dark wood trim white and implementing a calming palette.

Romine's favorite room is the living room. "I constantly go there to relax. The space also inspires conversation and community."

Most furniture has been acquired slowly over the last 20 to 30 years, many of the pieces coming from New York flea markets.

A favorite piece is the Modern Waterfall Style Inlaid Console Table by Bill Sofield for Baker Furniture. Another treasure is the sideboard in the living room. Acquired from a since closed antique store on Mack, the piece has traveled with Romine since 1996.

The best example, though, of Romine's

interior design sensibilities is the Andre Arbus for Baker Furniture chair, with its sloping arms and straight legs.

"There is a hard and curve to everything," Romine says. "I let shape drive the design. The contrasts of the masculine and feminine shapes play off each other in a fun way."

The conversation is mirrored in the couple's tastes as well. Romine explains the colors of the home are inspired by Laura's Puerto Rican roots, with subtle hues drawn from the sea and sand. As SVP Head of Media at Victoria's Secret, she also has an eye for design.

Art is a central theme of the home and runs in the family. Romine's brother, Aaron Romine, is an artist represented in New York by the Kravets Wehby Gallery. The small landscape over the fireplace was painted by Laura's uncle. And young Fernando's artistic talent shows he has





inherited the gene as well.

Aaron Romine's work appears in nearly every room. From a color block painting in the corner of the living room to another in the upstairs office to a largescale figurative painting in the dining room.

Because he is known primarily for his realist paintings, the eclectic mix of abstract styles Aaron has painted for the home reflects an ongoing dialogue between the two brothers.

"I encourage him to experiment and express himself," says Romine. "It is an interesting relationship of artists from different lenses, an understanding of how each other works."

Artistically speaking, Romine returned to school 15 years ago to study at the New York School of Interior Design.

"I'm headed back this fall to earn my bachelor's degree."

He has collaborated on professional projects and taken an active role in creating innovative pieces for his home. For example, Romine employed the expertise of Pat Casey of Mack Avenue Drapery & Interiors for all window treatments and pillows.

"We created a new, reverse pleat for the drapery," says Romine. He laughs, "Or at least, we have never seen it."

Creativity, Romine says, is something that should be afforded to all. In fact, art is so important to the Romines that they opened Atelier GP Kitchenware in The Village as a way to raise money for arts education. All revenue is donated to arts education programs or used to stock the store.

"It is an Art of Living concept," Romine says of the items available at Atelier. "Everything can be part of a thoughtful moment. Whether it is a cup or a pan these are all part of the art of caring for people."

In the family's home, this attention to detail and craftsmanship is obvious in the unique choice of wallpaper.

Scalamandré is widely used in the house. Its Arrow Root Grass Cloth covers

the living room walls. Upstairs, in Fernando's bedroom are the iconic Scalamandré Zebras. And in the first floor powder room, Scalamandré's Jardin De Chine. In other rooms, the walls wear Schumaker Sisal and Ralph Lauren Sisal.

"Each room has a certain energy, but no specific style, which I love about it," says Romine. "It is as if the rooms have been greyed out, like a veil over everything. With gold accents that give it energy and a sense of history."

Though Romine feels their current home is done, renovations continue elsewhere. "We are renovating our apartment in New York City, a 1929 one-bedroom for retirement."

And, as expected, the Romines plan to renovate with respect to the property's history.

he highly anticipated Grosse Pointe Woods Beautification Commission Flower Sale returns just in time for Mother's Day — Friday, May 6 and Saturday, May 7.

While the hanging baskets are the most conspicuous items to passersby, shoppers can also find flats, pots, specialty containers and compost from the Department of Public Works.

"The compost is off to the side, and many people don't realize it," says Beautification Commission member Gloria Arslanian. "It's the same compost used in the Woods medians and public spaces. It's like gold."

She adds, "We also offer a variety





of perennials, which are becoming more popular for those that want to see plantings that come up yearly after planting just once."

For advice about the flowers and more, Master Gardeners will be on site to help shoppers. Commission members, Grosse Pointe North National Honor Society students and other volunteers

will be available to load cars.

"We went with a new vendor last year and were so pleased. The quality was outstanding," says Arslanian. In fact, it was a sellout year. "W

was a sellout year. "We also changed the layout of the sale in recent years."

Shoppers are able to shop on pavement in front of Grosse Pointe Woods Municipal Center, as opposed to past years when many of the plants were sold on the grass. In early May, that can make for a muddy ordeal.

"We also have wagons available for shoppers' use," she adds.

Flower Sale proceeds mostly go to honoring residents and businesses at a November banquet hosted by the Grosse Pointe Woods Beautification Commission.

"We select homes in the area that have gone above and beyond in taking care of their homes. The sale pays for the banquet as well as the commemorative stakes awarded to the honorees." Remaining proceeds go toward beautifying the city, such as

planting flowers in the medians

But the real reason for the sale, says Arslanian, is that "We want to see our community and our city bloom."

Presales could open as early as mid-March for those who would like to pick up orders on Thursday, May 5. "People can pull up in the driveway and commission members will load the order into your car. We also offer free delivery on flowers if a minimum is spent."

The sale will take place in front of Grosse Pointe Woods Municipal Center Friday, May 6, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Saturday, May 7, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

 re you stretching enough? Probably not.
 When we're younger, especially if you

were an athlete involved in a sport, stretching was something you did as part of your training routine.

As we go through life and age, it seems we get further away from doing one of the healthiest, least time-consuming activities we can do for ourselves. Even those who



work out on a regular basis —strength training, cardio or yoga — treat a consistent, concentrated stretching plan as an afterthought.

Our muscles get tighter as we get older. A majority of people I've talked to who complain about having a bad back, unless diagnosed with an actual nerve or spine issue, are really talking about very tight back muscles that's causing them pain.

Muscles that aren't warmed up or stiff from lack of flexibility are primed for injury and soreness when put into sudden use. Likewise, inactivity like sitting for long periods or driving can have the same hurtful effect. You can stretch yourself out of that discomfort.

Young people should be stretching also, it's not just an age thing. They should know the difference between a static stretch and a dynamic stretch. They should learn how to fit 5-10 minutes of effective stretching into their day. They should learn how to make this a lifelong habit.

All of us can do this. You don't have to be good at stretching to get better at it. You can get started right away with just a few simple moves.

PONTE | health Heartburn

eartburn is a burning sensation that starts in the middle of your upper abdomen and travels up into the middle of the chest. It occurs when acid from the stomach travels up the esophagus, the tube that transports food from the mouth into the stomach ("acid

reflux"). Greasy, fatty

foods often cause heartburn. However, many relatively healthy foods can as well: dark chocolate. tomatoes, coffee, sparkling water, and citrus fruits.



Stress, smoking and being overweight also worsen heartburn. It can be accompanied by belching and nausea. It can also be severe enough to cause a sore throat, cough or hoarse voice. The pain of heartburn can be mild or so severe that it can be mistaken for a heart attack.

If heartburn occurs a few times a week, start with changing what you eat. Furthermore, avoid lying down within two hours of eating, don't overeat or wear tight clothes.

Antacids (Tums, Rolaids, Maalox, baking soda) give immediate relief for occasional symptoms. If the symptoms occur often, move up to acid reducers such as Pepcid twice a day. If after two weeks the symptoms persist, change to medicines that inhibit acid production such as Prilosec, Nexium and Prevacid. Unless directed by your doctor, these "Proton Pump Inhibitors" must not be taken for more than 2-3 weeks because lack of acid impairs digestion and nutrition.


If problems still persist, see your doctor. Unintentional weight loss, fatigue, vomiting or difficulty swallowing all need to be evaluated by your doctor.

ane Keough Davies has been a wedding planner for more than 50 years. Last September, she was at St. Paul's on the Lake when she noticed preparations for a wedding reception on The Grosse Pointe Academy's lawn.

"It occurred to me that my wedding was the first ever on that lawn," she says, "50 years ago, almost to the day." Jane introduced herself to Danielle DeGrande Roberts, the mother of the bride-to-be. Jane and Danielle began comparing the two weddings separated by a half century — on the same lawn. To Jane's surprise, Danielle invited her to return for a photo with the bride on the day of the ceremony.

"My wedding was quite modest compared to weddings today," Jane says. "I worked at The Academy as secretary to the headmaster. I designed my own gown and my mother and I made it. I also made my cathedrallength lace-edged veil."

Jane and her husband were married on Aug. 28, 1971, in The Academy's chapel. "It rained — poured, actually the day before and most of the morning on the day of our ceremony. But the ground soaked it up, the sun came out and by 3 p.m. it had turned into a beautiful day."

Callan Roberts and Tyler Wagner were married on an equally gorgeous day, Sept. 18, 2021 — 50 years later. "The weather was flawless," Callan says. "Seventy-two degrees, sunny, with a light breeze."

Callan's dress was a Galia Lahav design and her veil was a family heirloom, worn by her mother and her godmother.

Jane's wedding included two bridesmaids and two groomsmen. She gave the groom a last-minute haircut on the day before the wedding and used her office at The Academy as a dressing room.

Callan and Tyler had nine bridesmaids, nine groomsmen, two ushers and a ring-bearer. Viviano Flower Shop designed the bouquets for both weddings.

Callan says, "My bridesmaids wore long sage green gowns with metal beading. After I chose the dresses, we found out the design had been discontinued. My mother and I made phone calls all over the country to track down a dress for each bridesmaid."

Jane and her husband, who are both Irish, met through their membership in the Gaelic League. Callan and Tyler met seven years ago online. She was a senior at Wellesley College and he was finishing his PhD at MIT.

Both brides followed some of the usual traditions: "I had a penny in my shoe — an Irish coin," Jane says. "And I wore my grandmother's gold and diamond engagement pin." Callan's penny kept slipping out of her opentoed shoe, so she put it in her purse. She carried a handkerchief more than 100 years old.

Some 100 guests at Jane's reception enjoyed the music of an Irish band. About 230 people danced in a tent at Callan and Tyler's wedding. "We had a wooden floor in the tent, but it was

Neither couple had a proper honeymoon. Jane said school was about to start and she had to work. "Our guests came from all over the country and we wanted to stay around to visit with them." Callan and Tyler had planned a trip to Australia and New Zealand, but COVID-19 restrictions caused them to postpone it.

Neither bride recalled any major mishaps. No garbled vows; no forgotten rings; no inappropriate toasts.

"Just one minor thing," Callan says. "Both of the straps on my dress broke while we were dancing. But we had some safety pins in an emergency kit." 9






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

- 7. Cool cakes completely. Remove cakes from pans and slice off tops to level cakes
- 8. To make frosting: In mixing bowl, cream together cream cheese, butter and vanilla. Gradually add in powdered sugar and mix until smooth
- 9. Spread two large spoonfuls frosting over top of one cake and stack second cake on top. Frost entire cake with remaining frosting

Grosse Pointe-owned swim school teaches life skill and competitive technique

lmost exactly one year ago, Suntastic Swim School reopened after a pandemic-induced shutdown. "I was

shocked by how many people came back," owner Suzette Atrasz says. "The first three days, I made a welcome announcement for every class. All the parents were clapping, so excited to be back. I was in tears."

Atrasz, of Grosse Pointe Farms, started Suntastic Swim School in 2014, offering group lessons at Lakeview High School in St. Clair Shores, private lessons at home pools, and lifeguard services for private events.

Owner Suzette Atrasz helps Suntastic

"We live in a state where water is everywhere. Swimming is a life skill. It should never be a choice to not learn to swim," she says. "The kids might cry, but they need to learn this, just like potty training."

Her goal, Atrasz says, is to progress the swimmers at a fast rate. "The biggest reward is knowing I'm truly helping the kids. It brings me a lot of joy."

Along with being a full time teacher at Chippewa Valley High School and single mom to Sophia, 17, and Stanton, 13, Atrasz is involved in all areas of the business, attending group lessons at Lakeview High School, running social media accounts, and teaching the 'Champ' group lessons.

As a feeder program for USA Swimming, Suntastic readies swimmers for competitive swimming. "Many of the kids who swim for Grosse Pointe Gators, for example,

swam for Suntastic."

Atrasz herself is a lifelong Grosse Pointe swimmer who swam Division 1 at Eastern Michigan University. Her coaching experience spans high school, USA Swimming and Michigan Inter-Club Swimming Association teams.

Atrasz's daughter, Sophia, has followed in her mother's footsteps, recently earning All State status in the 200 Freestyle and 500 Freestyle, along with breaking the Grosse Pointe South High School record for 500 Freestyle.

Like Sophia, most instructors are local swim team members and high school students trained by Atrasz and her supervisor Sumer St. Germaine. Each has CPR/First Aid; Lifeguard Instruction; and Water Safety Instructor certifications. "They are energetic, love kids, love to teach, engage with swimmers and create an inviting environment for children who are scared," says Atrasz.

In total, Suntastic has taught over 3,000 children in the area, including children with special needs.

In the spring and summer,

Suntastic focuses on private lessons at home pools. "We bring swim school to your home for private group lessons at residences all over southeast Michigan," says Atrasz.

Registration for the spring lessons at Lakeview High School opens in early March. Lessons begin Monday, April 4. Early registration is highly recommended, as classes fill quickly.







French Braid


By Anne Tyler The Garretts take their first and last family vacation in the summer of 1959. They hardly ever venture beyond Baltimore, yet are far apart in other

Hired to investigate the black-skied Night City, Detective Gaspery-Jacques Roberts discovers an anomaly in



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



Turkey and Bean Tostadas

Serves 5

Salsa

Ingredients

2 cups chopped tomatoes (about 2 medium tomatoes)

1 medium avocado, halved, pitted and diced

1 large ear of corn, husks and silk discarded, kernels removed

1-2 medium fresh jalapenos, seeds and ribs discarded, finely chopped

2 tbs. finely chopped red onion **2 tbs.** fresh lime juice

Tostadas

- Ingredients
- nonstick cooking spray
- **5** corn tortillas (6 inches each)

8 ounces ground skinless turkey

breast

- 2 tsp. chili powder
- 1 tsp. ground cumin
- 1 tsp. ground coriander
- **1 can** (15 1/2 ounces) no-salt-added black beans, rinsed and drained

2 tbs. water

Directions

- 1. To make salsa, in small bowl, stir tomatoes, avocado, corn, jalapenos, onions and lime juice. Set aside
- 2. Preheat oven to 400 F
- 3. To make tostadas, line baking sheet with aluminum foil.

Lightly spray foil with nonstick cooking spray. Place tortillas on baking sheet. Lightly spray tortillas with nonstick cooking spray. Using fork, pierce tortillas several times to prevent from filling with air

- 4. Bake tortillas 5-6 minutes on each side, or until golden brown
- 5. In medium nonstick saucepan over medium-high heat, cook turkey, chili powder, cumin and coriander 5-6 minutes, or until turkey is no longer pink, stirring occasionally to turn and break up turkey
- 6. Add beans and water. Cook 5 minutes, or until beans are heated through. Using potato masher, coarsely mash beans. Remove from heat
- 7. To assemble tostadas, spread turkey mixture over each tortilla. Top with salsa and enjoy!

Auto No-Fault Insurance Update

St was announced in early December, 2021 that the Michigan Catastrophic Claims Association (MCCA) will refund \$3 billion of its \$5 billion projected surplus, resulting in refunds of \$400 per vehicle to Michigan drivers.

All vehicles that were insured as of 11:59 p.m. on October 31, 2021 are eligible to receive a refund if the vehicle was covered by a policy that meets the minimum insurance requirements for operating a vehicle on Michigan roads.

Under the 2019 no-fault law changes, the MCCA was to analyze the need for a refund to motorists by September of 2022. The surplus funds will be turned over by the MCCA to the insurance companies in March, 2022.

The MCCA has announced that the refund will be \$400 per eligible car or motorcycle. For example, if you had auto insurance policies for two cars as of 11:59 p.m. on October 31, 2021, you will receive a refund of \$800. The refund is \$80 per historical vehicle.

A refund check or an ACH deposit will be issued to eligible Michigan policyholders. If you are eligible to receive a refund, it will be sent to you by your insurance company and you will not have to do anything to receive it.





Is your dog protected?

ith the impending warmer weather, we all hope to get outside more, humans and furkids alike! Be aware, however, dangers can be lurking: even in our own backyards.

Ticks and tick-borne diseases are increasing in Michigan. Any day in which the temperature rises above freezing will allow ticks to "wake up" and start looking for a host to jump on. Once attached, they can start to transmit diseases such as Lyme disease.



Fleas also start to become active once the weather warms up. Not just a nuisance, they can cause skin irritation, inflame allergies, and cause tapeworms if ingested. Since our pets could potentially bring these unwelcome guests into our homes, it is important that we use preventative products on our pets, either topical or oral. Speak with your veterinarian regarding the best recommendations for your own pet, such as Nexgard or Simparica.

Another preventable disease which is on the rise is Leptospirosis. Leptospirosis is a bacterial disease which is spread through the urine of infected wildlife such as raccoons, opossums, squirrels, rats and mice and can affect both animals and humans. The bacteria can get into the water or soil and survive there for weeks or even months. According to the CDC, without treatment Leptospirosis can lead to kidney damage, meningitis, liver failure, respiratory distress and even death.

Fortunately, there is an effective and safe vaccine for dogs against Leptospirosis. This vaccine is typically included in the annual canine vaccines we administer here in our clinic, but be sure to consult with your veterinarian if you have any questions.

Meanwhile, let's all "think spring" and get outside to enjoy the beauty of nature!
